Oxford Fire Dept. millage on Nov. 5 ballot

Who? Oxford Township and Village voters.

What? A millage proposal to support operations and capital expenses for fire protection, emergency medical services and advanced life support services. Voters will decide on a 5.25-mill, 6-year request, which represents **a renewal**, **plus an increase**. The previous fire millage expired in December 2023 and was last levied at a rate of 4.3997 mills due to Headlee rollbacks. **Without this millage, there is no dedicated funding for the fire department**.

How much? One mill equals \$1 for every \$1,000 of a property's taxable value, which is generally equal to half the assessed value. If approved, the fire millage will cost property owners \$525 per \$100,000 of their taxable value. **This represents an \$85 increase for every \$100,000 of taxable value.** The millage is expected to generate \$6.42 million in its first year.



In 2023, the OXFD responded to 1,891 medical calls. The Oakland County Medical Control Authority recognized OXFD personnel for saving the lives of two cardiac arrest patients last year.

Did you know?

• The Oxford Fire Dept. responded to **2,348 calls** for service in 2023.

• The OXFD offers free monthly CPR classes to the public. Since September 2023, a total of **138 people** have learned lifesaving skills.

• The OXFD distributes and installs smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, free of charge. • There are **24** career firefighters/ paramedics. This includes 18 shift members, Emergency Medical Services coordinator, fire marshal, fire inspector, recruitment and retention manager, assistant chief and chief.

 \bullet There are currently ${\bf 20}$ paid-on-call firefighters and EMTs.

• Since 2020, the OXFD has held an EMT class for **Oxford High School seniors.** To date, **33 graduates** have earned EMT licenses.



Why is the OXFD seeking an increase with a renewal?

• All **4 ambulances must be replaced**. Three are 2015 models and one is from 2013. They have 115,444 to 171,226 miles on them as of August 2024. Three replacements were ordered for **\$1.21 million**.

• **Two fire engines**, built in 2002 and 2010, have **reached or exceeded the age** at which they should no longer be used for frontline service, according to the National Fire Protection Association. It will cost **\$1.55 million** to replace both engines.

• The OXFD has spent nearly **\$325,000 on vehicle repairs** and maintenance since 2022. Up to **\$45,000 more** could be spent by December 2024.

• The **entire air pack system** must be replaced over the next two years. Firefighters need air tanks to breathe while inside burning structures. It will cost approximately **\$300,000**. If awarded, a grant request could cover up to \$130,000.

• In the coming years, the OXFD will need to replace its utility vehicle for grass fires, all cardiac monitors, the HVAC system at Station #1 and the pavement at both stations.
